Our Story

After working in the industry for over fifteen years, the founder and owner of Charity for All of South Carolina (“CFASC”) saw how much families and loved ones of hospice patients wanted to help others through donations. These donations often were monetary. However, monetary donations are not always possible. End-of-life care has unforeseeable expenses. When a hospice patient passes away, they leave more behind than just a legacy. They have clothes, furniture, books, or other personal tangible items. Families and loved ones are left with what to do with these things.

We provide an outlet for family members or loved ones to donate a hospice patient’s slightly used clothes, furniture, books, or other tangible items after their passing. We also work with businesses and other individuals to collect slightly used goods to support our strategic goals. We then sell the goods in our thrift store to other businesses and individuals. Proceeds from sales help to support the programs for our “foundation of choice,” the Hospice & Palliative Care Foundation (“HPCF”). And, because we are not owned by a corporation or have executives to pay, more of our sales go right back into the programs.



HPCF was founded in 2000 to help hospice patients with expenses that insurance does not cover like assistance with rent, utilities, and quality of life. Over the last twenty years, HPCF has expanded its programs to include camp events and education. A broad overview of HPCF’s programs is below.

CFASC began its journey in November 2023 operating under the HPCF hat. Over the past few months, we have come to realize that we can help more than families and loved ones of hospice patients. This is how we derived our name, **Charity for All**. We are not just about hospice or camp events or even education. We want to help everyone in the communities that we serve and around the state. To operate more successfully, we have decided to operate the thrift store as a separate entity. This will allow 100% of HPCF’s donations and grants to be used for direct support.

Through generous donations of goods by businesses and individuals, our thrift store can:
